English & Media









Lord of the Flies with year 8

William Golding's dystopian novel 'Lord of the Flies' is read by all students in year 8 as part of the curriculum. Students discover and discuss the plot of the story, the main theme and characterisation of the leading figures, as well as the contextual influences. Students learn how to annotate and analyse a text and how to write an essay that tracks a character across a story, whilst using a range of tier 2 and 3 vocabulary connected to the novel.





Creative writing club ...

Creative writing club takes place every Thursday after school in G32 and everyone is welcome.

Students have the opportunity to work on their own stories, or help put together the school magazine 'The Durrington Daily' which is written and edited entirely by the students.

Romeo & Juliet with year 9

During the Spring term year 9 students study Romeo and Juliet . The key focus is to familiarise students with Shakespeare's language, an understanding of the plot, characterisation and key vocabulary. Contextual knowledge of the Elizabethan era and theatre is introduced. Romeo and Juliet is also studied in Year 9 Drama. Students build on their knowledge of universal themes and conventions of a tragedy taught in year 7, 8 and 9. Vocabulary is introduced to support them in their future study of Macbeth at KS4.

Students are taught the different language devices to use within their writing, a range of vocabulary and a variety of sentence structures to diversify their writing. They will also have the opportunity to visit The Globe Theatre and watch a Shakespearian production during KS4.

Media Studies has enabled me to further develop my skills of analysis through deconstructing various print advertisements, magazine front covers, newspaper front pages, music videos etc., and understanding their deeper meanings and how they

target specific audiences. In Year 10, I was given the exciting chance to create my own special interest magazine front cover and double page feature article as part of my coursework. Whilst this presented many challenges along the way (of which I persevered through and eventually overcame), it also forced me to improve my practical skills and allowed me to fully appreciate the decision-making process that takes place during the developmental stages of a mainstream product like this. I truly believe that Media Studies is one of the most relevant, and therefore widely appealing, GCSE subjects that us students at Durrington High are given the opportunity of pursuing in Years 10 and 11. It balances the academic elements of English with the variety of content covered in the creative arts, and I would recommend it highly to those who are either contemplating choosing it or have not even considered it yet."

The Durrington Journey

The spring term promises to be a very busy term for the Careers Team at DHS. As year 11s receive their mock exam results the careers team lead by Mr Henry will turn their attention to supporting students with the final details of their college applications or helping those students who as of yet remain unsure of their next steps. The careers team work tirelessly to ensure that we have excellent partnerships with our local colleges, and on the year 11 parents evening both Mr Henry and Worthing & Northbrook Colleges will be present so parents, carers and students can make enquiries about existing or future course applications.

This term has already seen the school develop a new partnership with Worthing and Adur Chamber of Commerce. This partnership will continue to develop the careers offer at Durrington, providing us with opportunities to have outside speakers placement, we are very proud that from local businesses run sessions with our students and also offer subject specific careers advice.



The first week of February also sees our Year 10 students go on their 4-day work experience placements between the 5th and 8th February. As one of the only schools in the local area still providing a full work experience over 230 students will be undertaking a range of placements across our local area and further afield.

next steps ...careers

There will be an assembly with Mr Henry on 16th January as well as SME lessons to help them prepare. The work experience week will culminate with our annual Careers day on the 9th February. During the day all year 10 students will take part in various workshops led by our own careers team and also members of the local business community. During the day students will be given advice on how to write a successful CV, take part in mock interviews with business leaders from our local area and also have sessions with further education providers including Worthing and Northbrook Colleges.

Inspire Scholars Programme - St John's College Oxford



St John's College Oxford

We are delighted to announce that we have entered into a partnership with The University of Oxford – St John's College to become a member of their Inspire Scholars Programme.

We are very proud to be one of only 30 schools in the south and south east region to have been selected for this partnership. Joining the programme marks the start of a 3-year partnership with St John's College as we seek more and more opportunities to develop and raise our students' aspirations. The programme will be opened to 30 students in year 9 this year, before a further 60 students will join the

programme over the next two academic years. Students invited to be part of the programme will receive a diet of extra-curricular sessions, known as Inspire Clubs, planned by Oxford University academics and run by our own subject specialists on a range of topics such as Viking History and The Science of Black Holes.

In addition to this all students on the programme, and in fact all students in year 9 will have access the virtual summer school run by St John's, while up to 6 students may be invited to a fully funded in-person summer school in Oxford.

Ukraine war: US says Russia using North Korea ballistic missiles



Russia has used ballistic missiles and launchers supplied by North Korea in its war on Ukraine, the US has said.

National Security Council spokesman John Kirby called it a "significant and concerning escalation" relating to Pyongyang's support for Russia.

He said the US would raise the matter at the UN Security Council and impose additional sanctions on those working to facilitate arms transfers. Moscow has denied any such collaboration.


