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Curriculum spotlight ...









"The computer science rooms at Durrington are so much better than at primary school, they are really modern and spacious - you can move around them easily and we get really big screens to work from, you can always see the teachers board from wherever you are sat. Computer Science







Year 7 have been writing their own code for the Macqueen Micro; bit robots where they were set the challenge of making them perform a co-ordinated dance. Year 8 are learning about the parts of the inside of the computer such as CPU, RAM, heat sink. They have the chance to see what they look like, hold them and learn what each part does.

"Micro; bits have been the best part of our lessons so far, they have been fun to learn how to program, in our first lesson we had them smiling at us and making sounds, I had used them before in a workshop on music in London so I was keen to learn more about them in school." *Rio-Mya in year 7*













This week year 9 were learning their second sorting algorithm - merge sort. This is how a computer sorts data from lowest to highest value in a list, in the previous lesson the students did a practical activity where they looked at why this would be of benefit to computers to speed up the process of searching, as lets face it sometimes a google search is like finding a needle in a haystack!



"I went from hating computing at primary school to loving it at Durrington, it's now my favourite subject and first choice of subjects to pick at GCSE.

You do so much here in computing, a huge mixture of topics, you never get bored. I have enjoyed the micro; bits the best and programming them.







The geography department runs various trips and field work studies to different locations throughout KS3 and 4 with the ultimate experience being a residential trip to Iceland.
