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


With year 7

Modern Foreign Languages



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Curriculum spotlight ...

Year 7

This term year 7 are looking at the arrangement and history of the periodic table, the properties of metals and non-metals, and chemical formulae.

They will also cover a 'Health & Disease' topic learning about the transmissions of pathogens, as well as food groups and malnutrition.

Currently they are studying forces and motion and the units of measure and conversions.

Year 8

Year 8s are busy discovering more about energy, how it is stored, and interpreting heating and cooling curves.

They are also looking at reactions, combustions, thermal decomposition, exothermic and endothermic reactions.

This term they will recap and build on their knowledge of organ systems,

tissues and cells, and look at the role of the digestive system and enzymes, the nervous system and how it responds to the environment, as well as the respiratory system and the process of ventilation.

Year 9

This term students are embedding their knowledge of atomic structure and the reactivity and predicted outcomes of displacement reactions. They will also cover electrolytes and the reactions of ions during electrolysis.

Students will learn in more depth the function of the digestive system and the CNS and reflex pathway, as well as how gas is exchanged in the alveoli as part of the respiratory function, and the role of the circulatory system, including the structure of the heart and components of blood.

They will also be studying transverse and longitudinal waves and the effect of frequency and amplitude.

Careers day

Year 10 took part in a whole host of activities during our careers day on the 9th February.

We welcomed sixty volunteers into school from local businesses and Further Education Colleges, and students took part in mock interviews, apprenticeship and post-16 transition workshops, CV writing skills classes, and the 'what's my line' job game!

In the Post-16 transition workshop students looked at their future options and the right path to take when considering future careers.

The apprentice workshops gave the students the opportunity to learn more about the different apprenticeships on offer and whether this would be a suitable option for them.



The mock interview workshops gave students the chance to practice their skills with local business providers and gain valuable feedback, as well as gain valuable advice on CV writing skills.

The 'what's my job' game gave students a fun and interactive way to improve their own questioning skills, as well as learn more about the wide variety of potential future careers.

Work experience

This year we were proud to once again offer the chance for our year 10 students to take part in community work experience. We believe this is a hugely valuable way for young people to find out about the world as well as about themselves. This year over 240 students secured a work placement with the majority going out for 4 days in the last week before half term. Another 25 took part in our first ever in-school work experience event with McDonalds.

Many students secured their own places with our careers team supporting as well. Most stayed in the Worthing area with some travelling as far as Brighton, Burgess Hill and Gatwick. Students had SME lessons with a preparation assembly beforehand and were issued work experience logbooks to complete before and during their placements. Following their return to school they were encouraged to reflect on their experience and consider how it might shape them in the future.
