From the week beginning Monday the 24th, Durrington High School is celebrating diversity in our community and the way in which different cultures have shaped our world.

During these four days, students will be learning about diverse individuals in each of their subjects – such as Guinness World Record holder mathematician: Shakuntala Devi. In History, students will be focusing on the importance of Muslim Scholars in the Islamic Golden Age and the differences in advancements between the Medieval Muslim world and the Medieval English world. In English, KS3 will be reading a range of LGBTQ+ texts from across the globe to explore the importance of recognising their contributions to literature. In Science, students will be learning about the intertwining of science and religion with a focus on how humans have evolved to be apart of different cultures. In Music, there will be a workshop on the background of the Reggae genre and how it has been influenced by the Windrush generation. Lastly, in PE, students will be taking part in various non-native sports from different countries around the globe to see how sports can impact culture worldwide.



# Computer Science trip to LEGOLAND

Last week the Computer Science department took 90 year 8 students to LEGOLAND where they took part in eight one-hour long Lego Spike robot workshops.

The students learnt how to build and program the robots to complete a number of set tasks with the aim to create a self-driving robot. Some of the groups used the colour sensors to get the robots to follow a green or blue line. Other groups had a go at the distant sensors on their robot.

A great deal of fun was had by the students as they practised their code, and eventually succeeded at the task they were set.

The students also got to enjoy the theme park, which was relatively quiet, and had a fun day out making lots of new friendships.

# **Hampton Court Palace**

The History department took 60 year 7 students to Hampton Court Palace to explore the significance of the Tudor period.

We explored the Tudor Kitchens, examining the scale of the operation it would have taken to feed Henry VIII's court.

We also visited the Great Hall and the magnificent Royal Chapel, as well as testing ourselves in the Maze, thankfully finding our way out with all the students!

The students participated in a workshop discussing the Religious Rollercoaster, exploring the dramatic changes in religious practices and policies during the Tudor period.

This workshop delves into the tumultuous shifts in religion under the reigns of Henry VIII, Edward VI, Mary I, and Elizabeth I, illustrating how these changes impacted the lives of ordinary people and the Royal Court.

We ended the day with a quick visit to the gift shop and then it was back to school with the year 7 students who were all a credit to DHS.

He was awarded the Squad Member of the Year award a couple of weeks ago by his coach for his dedication and aspiration.





# The Amazing Book Awards


