Year 10 GCSE PE

Year 10s have started their GCSE PE course looking at health, fitness and well-being, as well as the socio-cultural influences in physical activity and sport.

Their introductory unit covers the components of fitness, including key words and definitions that underpin much of the paper 1 content.

Physical Education

In this unit they will look at the meaning of health and fitness: physical, mental/ emotional and social health, linking participation in physical activity to exercise, and sport to health and wellbeing.

They also look at the consequences of a sedentary lifestyle including obesity and how it may affect performance in physical activity and sport, how we use energy, and the reasons for having a balanced diet, including the role of nutrition such as carbohydrates, fat, protein, vitamins and minerals, and the importance of maintaining water balance (hydration).

Year 11 GCSE PE

Year 11 are now in their second year of their GCSE course and are studying sports psychology, sociocultural influences, and well-being in physical activity and sport.

They will show examples of, and evaluations, of the types of feedback and guidance, including the arousal and the Inverted U theory, application of how optimal arousal has to vary in relation to the skill/stress management techniques, aggression and personality, and intrinsic and extrinsic motivation, including evaluation of their merits.

Students began their GCSE course perfecting their performance solo piece. They will learn physical, technical and expressive skills, as well as learn about lighting, costume, set, aural setting, and movement content of professional works.

The year 7 boys football team are still competing in the National Cup and are awaiting their 4th round fixture to be announced. They are also through to the final of the District League which will be played on Thursday at Steyning Town Football Club. We are also extremely proud of 4 team members who have made it into the West Sussex District squad, congratulations to Oaklie Corbett, Olive Hosier, Finley Barker and Riley Tapscott.

The year 8 football team have had a fantastic season so far. They won all 5 of their District League games qualifying for the semi-final where they beat Steyning Towers 7-2. In the final they played Shoreham Academy, in a fantastically competitive game that could have gone either way Durrington lost narrowly 3-2. Archie Waite scored both goals for Durrington. The team is also continuing strongly in both the County and National Cups and they have games next week to qualify through to the 4th round of both competitions.

Year 10 boys' rugby has seen a record number of students attend the club and representing the school in District fixtures. The year 11 team have been competitive within the District League finishing 3rd overall.

The year 7 girls played their first basketball league game winning 58-4! In football the U14 girls are through to the 2nd round of the County Cup against The Littlehampton Academy. The year 10 girls' netball team have had a fantastic start to their season winning both their games against Bohunt and Worthing High School. The U16 girls' rugby team won both games in the first round of the Sussex Cup, and the U16 girls' football had a fantastic season coming a narrow second in the league. They are also through to the next round of County Cup with 6-1 win against Tonbridge House.

Year 7

SME lessons in year 7 began by supporting their transition into secondary school, looking at the importance of kindness, teamwork and taking responsibilities. Year 7s first topic was a discussion on bullying, ensuring that every child is aware of how to report bullying both inside and outside of school.

Year 8

Students start the year by looking at what it means to have an identity, how we identify ourselves, and then how that identity fits into larger communities of people in our local, national and international worlds. We explore people who are excluded from those communities, and ways that we can aid excluded people who are in need. Including learning about their rights supported by the Equality Act 2010.

Curriculum spotlight ...



Year 9

Students in year 9 have explored the structure of our justice system in the UK. They have looked at Human Rights and how these are protected by our police and legal systems. Using the Equality Act 2010 and Human Rights Act 1998 students will evaluate how law and order is in maintained in the UK. Students will also explore the efficiency of the prison system in the UK.

This half term they are looking at the effects and dangers of illegal drugs, including the law surrounding the possession and supply of drugs, understanding where to get help with addiction, and the short and long term consequences of drug use.

Students will also have two special careers lessons where they will discuss options linking to their GCSE option choices during the Spring term.

Year 10

Students in year 10 started their year learning about different types of abuse that people can be subjected to in relationships, spotting the early warning signs of these and also ways to seek help if you or anyone you know is involved in an abusive relationship. Students will also look at survivor stories, and inspirational figures as part of this unit.

Year 11

During the first half term all students have completed their CV and have been looking at career paths of interest as they begin to plan for their continued education Post-16.



This half term our year 11s are looking at identifying the similarities between physical and mental health and are encouraged into open discussion about mental health and what may impact on this. Common mental health disorders will also be discussed as well as ways to look after their own mental wellbeing. They will look at health checks and services that students should visit in the future with their GP such as smear tests, as well as look at how they can check their own bodies for signs of illness.

Year 10 GCSE citizenship

At the start of their GCSE course students got to grips with who we are in the UK; specifically, tackling questions such as 'Who is in our community?' (Local & National) and 'How are groups in our community treated?' Students will use this knowledge to assess how groups in our community are treated, what is happening to the UK population, discrimination and the law, as well how human rights protect citizens.





Chanctonbury Community Playscheme (CCPS) are a volunteer-led charity based in Worthing who provide fun and inclusive summer experiences for children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities. This summer, 13 DHS students were part of the volunteering team, and we are extremely proud of them all.

Each one of them would have given a minimum of thirty hours of completely voluntary time working 1:1 with children with complex additional needs. The friendship, care and genuine desire to make a positive difference to the children was incredible. Some of the children are extremely complex in terms of their additional needs (non-verbal, challenging behaviour and/or no sense of risk/danger) and yet our students were amazing and worked so hard to make their experience a positive one.

It's a huge commitment and genuinely amazing the time our students gave, and also absolutely brilliant to see how each one of them grew in both skills and confidence during their time volunteering.




Perseverance

When Maddie hatches a scheme for a secret sleepover she ends up waking up to a nightmare. She's alone—left behind in a town that has been mysteriously evacuated and abandoned.

With no one to rely on, no power, and no working phone lines or internet access, Maddie slowly learns to survive on her own. Her only companions are a Rottweiler named George and all the books she can read. As months pass, she escapes natural disasters, looters, and wild animals. But Maddie's most formidable enemy is the crushing loneliness she faces every day.

When the Taliban took control of the Swat Valley in Pakistan, one girl spoke out. Malala refused to be silenced and fought for her right to an education. On Tuesday, October 9, 2012, when she was fifteen, she almost paid the ultimate price. She was shot in the head at point-blank range while riding the bus home from school, and few expected her to survive.



Pride

This is a fictionalised retelling of one of the most famous female football teams in history. Dick, Kerr Girls. All members of the team worked at the Dick, Kerr munitions factory. The team remained in existence for 45 years, with as many as 50,000 supporters.

This books tells the story of a teenager called Hettie, who is desperate to help the war effort and goes to work in the factory before joining the team.


